22/19 **OUTCOME OF THE CONSULTATION ON THE DRAFT TACKLING HATE CRIME TOGETHER POLICY** Consultation on a proposed draft policy in relation to Hate Crime ran from 28 January - 11 March 2019. 21 responses were received of which 86% agreed with the aims of the policy, but a small number felt that the policy needed to be strengthened in relation to people with a learning disability; 86% were happy with the definition of Hate Crime and Hate Incidents, but a small number queried or misunderstood the detailed examples given; and 86% felt it was clear how people reported Hate Crimes, but a small number felt the process could be made more user friendly.

Following the consultation, minor amendments have been made to the Tackling Hate Crime Together Policy and the revised document was attached to the report.

RESOLVED to (1) note the consultation feedback; and

(2) approve adoption of the Tackling Hate Crime Together Policy by the Council.

23/19 **GRANT TO DERBYSHIRE GYPSY LIAISON GROUP**

An application for a grant for the financial year 2018-2019 has been received from the Derbyshire Gypsy Liaison Group, requesting £3,500.

The Group plays an extremely important role in supporting the three Council owned Traveller sites in Derbyshire and also produces a newsletter "The Traveller", assistance with private site planning applications and dealing with issues of education, health and welfare of Travellers. The County Council has held regular discussions with the Liaison Group on issues arising from unauthorised encampments, site management and on developing good practice in dealing with unauthorised encampments.

RESOLVED that the Derbyshire Gypsy Liaison Group be awarded £3,500 for the year 2018-2019, subject to the County Council's standard conditions of grants.

Derbyshire School Holiday Food Programme

1. Purpose of the report:

To seek approval from the Cabinet Member for Health and Communities for the grant payment of £20,000 to Rural Action Derbyshire to continue the delivery of the Schools Holiday Food Programme for a 12 month period from July 2019.

2. Information and analysis:

The Derbyshire School Holiday Food Programme is a very successful countywide programme addressing national concerns on the extent and causes of hunger amongst children during school holiday periods.

In summer 2016 Feeding Derbyshire established 19 projects in local communities experiencing high levels of deprivation, and with high levels of eligibility for Free School Meals. Working in partnership with schools, faith communities, children's centres, Big Local grant-funded communities and district and borough councils, the projects aim to ensure children benefit from nutritious food and enrichment activities during school holiday periods throughout the year.

Since 2016 the programme has gone from strength to strength and subsequently an additional 12 projects have been established - these are funded by FareShare, bringing the total number of projects in Derbyshire to 31.

FareShare is a UK charity ensuring surplus food reaches vulnerable groups by redistributing good food to frontline services. Currently Public Health at Derbyshire County Council fund the annual subscription fee to FareShare to supply 19 projects with healthy, nutritious, in-date food. Each project (made up of multiple partners and volunteers) in turn make up the food to provide children with a range of breakfasts, packed lunches, snacks and drinks, alongside activities ranging from arts and crafts, family reading (DCC Library Services), games and sports (district and borough councils), family cook and eat workshops, Mad Science and dance.

National evidence shows that:

- In the UK over one in four children are living in poverty once housing costs have been deducted from their income. This is reflected in the rates seen in Derbyshire.
- Children who regularly miss out on meals and arrive at school hungry and thirsty are at a significant disadvantage, lacking concentration and the ability to learn.
- The loss of free school meals during the holiday costs a family £30-40 per week.

During the school holiday periods in the 2018/19 academic year, the projects funded through the Council have achieved the following:

- supplied 37,113 meals in total to 1,395 children per week during the Summer holidays
- supplied projects with enough food to give out 1,052 food parcels over the Christmas school holiday period
- supplied projects with 5,030 meals over the Easter school holidays. This included sufficient food for 440 cook and eat meals

Additional funding for a 12 month period will ensure continuation of the programme. The funding will support Rural Action Derbyshire to manage the School Holiday Food Programme from July 2019. This will include direct liaison with FareShare and local project providers, and operational management of the programme to support the continuation of the existing 31 projects, and collection of information on numbers of young people and families accessing the projects.

In April 2019, the Feeding Derbyshire Partnership agreed to review the delivery and sustainability of the School Holiday Food Programme as part of the broader Feeding Derbyshire initiative. The review will allow the Feeding Derbyshire Partnership to identify alternative funding sources to secure future delivery of the existing programme, and reduce reliance on funding from Public Health, in light of continued year-on-year reductions to the Public Health grant.

3. Social Value considerations:

Derbyshire School Holiday Food Programme as part of the wider Feeding Derbyshire initiative is ensuring the sustainability of local charities. The Public Health grant funding will afford a lead-in time for Rural Action

Derbyshire and FareShare to secure future funds to manage, develop and sustain the School Holiday Food Programme over subsequent years.

Feeding Derbyshire and FareShare is supporting local volunteers to gain the skills and personal development opportunities required to transition into paid employment.

4. Financial considerations:

The total amount for the project is £20,000 which will be met within the Public Health Ring-fenced budget for 2019-20. This will be grant funded to Rural Action Derbyshire.

Grant funding to Shift Together to deliver the Fit4Life Programme in workplaces across Derbyshire

1. Purpose of the report:

To seek cabinet member approval to award a grant of £100,000 to Shift Together (formerly The Community Sports Trust) to continue the Fit4Life project which aims to increase physical activity level in workplaces across Derbyshire.

2. Information and analysis:

Levels of overweight and obesity in Derbyshire are significantly higher than the England average. Overweight and obesity develops over time as a result of an imbalance between energy intake (i.e. what we eat and drink) and energy usage (i.e. how active we are). Whilst on average people in Derbyshire are more likely to be active than the England average (68% compared with 66%), our adult population are less likely to:

- Eat 5 portions or more of fruit and veg per day
- Do any walking in a week
- Cycle 3 times in a week (either for travel or leisure)

In addition to supporting people to maintain a healthy weight, regular physical activity is important for reducing the risk of cardiovascular disease, certain cancers, type 2 diabetes, falls and mental ill health. Physical activity can also improve health outcomes and quality of life of people who already have long-term conditions, for example it can lead to reduced weight and improved insulin sensitivity in people with type 2 diabetes.

Current levels of physical inactivity are partly due to insufficient participation in physical activity during leisure time and an increase in sedentary behaviour during occupational and domestic activities. Likewise, an increase in the use of "passive" modes of transport e.g. car driving, has also been associated with declining physical activity levels.

The workplace has been identified as one setting in which efforts can be focused effectively to improve health and wellbeing, and reduce physical inactivity. In 2018 Derbyshire County Council funded a pilot of the Fit4Life programme at

Chesterfield Royal Hospital and in Adult Care. The pilot programme has included:

- a) Body Health MOTs, including online assessment, which are delivered by our DCC Live Life Better Derbyshire Team.
- b) One-to-one coaching by a Fit4Life Coach. Staff who are identified through the health MOT are invited to join a programme that seeks to understand lifestyle patterns and provide one to one coaching and motivational interviewing to support lifestyle behaviour changes.
- c) Use of an ActiveInsight accelerometer for 12 weeks. Participants wear the band for 1 week initially with no coaching, followed by a further 11 weeks and engage in fortnightly 30 minute coaching sessions to consider activity levels and lifestyle behaviours which may improve levels of physical and mental wellbeing. Results are tracked using the band readouts as well as questionnaires at 4 and 12 weeks. Participants are encouraged to join local activity sessions appropriate to their shift pattern, fitness levels and interests. Band readouts are considered by the participants and the coach to identify areas for improvement.

Interim evaluation of the pilot has been positive. Referrals began in Autumn 2018 and the programme coach is working on a 1:1 basis with participants to provide coaching, advice and signposting. The accelerometer is giving participants accurate and detailed information about their lifestyle behaviours, sleep patterns and time spent being active or sedentary. At the end of January 2019, 20 ActiveInsight accelerometers had been issued, and 27 participants had registered to join the next cohort in Spring 2019.

Early findings from the first cohort of participants had recorded:

- An increase in energy expenditure
- An increase in sleep duration
- A reduction in sedentary time (by an average of 1 hour a day)
- An increase in active time (by more than 2 hours a day on average)

In addition, the programme coach is working with HR teams at the hospital and group managers in ASC to explore a variety of methods to promote a culture of physical activity in the workplace. The result of this work has been the development of new physical activity related opportunities such as:

- New activity sessions introduced in Staveley and Hasland Adult Social Care settings.
- Agreed use of the physio room gym equipment at the Staveley Centre for staff after the end of shifts.
- A Jog Group at the hospital is now regularly active and open to all.
- Staff at Hasland ASC have started a 'weight group' to monitor their weight together informally and increase levels of physical activity.

To further explore the impact of the programme on behaviour change Nottingham Trent University have been commissioned to run an independent evaluation of the pilot, this report will be available in late 2019.

There are a number of opportunities to build on this programme to support the health and wellbeing of workforces across Derbyshire, and to increase the interconnectedness with other programmes of activity such as our Live Life Better Derbyshire Services, Healthy Workplaces Derbyshire and the Public Health Locality Programme.

We are seeking permission to fund an expansion of the programme over the next 2 years, to both support other work settings and to enable the development of a self-sustaining model for Fit4Life over time. We consider that the programme should be tested in a number of different workplaces, beginning with Call Derbyshire. Given that the programme coach will need to build strong relationships with teams working in the locality (e.g. LLBD delivery staff, Health Workplaces Derbyshire and the Public Health Locality Teams) and develop a good understanding of opportunities available in the local area, we propose that the work should be focused in 2 and no more than 3 of our Derbyshire Districts and Boroughs. One will be the Derbyshire Dales (given the location of Call Derbyshire), with the other site(s) to be agreed between Shift Together and the Public Health Physical Activity, Healthy Workplaces and Live Life Better Derbyshire Teams.

Through the proposed expansion of this project as a minimum we would expect the Provider (SHIFT) to deliver the following:

- Regular and robust reporting of findings i.e. quarterly reports
- Illustration of creation of appropriate links to ensure sustainable activities to maintain behaviour change.
- Demonstrate clear links with Live Life Better Derbyshire
- Expand programme across up to 3 districts (to include at least 5 workplaces)
- Expand into different types of workplaces i.e. other places of work with set shift patterns that make it difficult to access traditional physical activity opportunities.

3. Social Value considerations:

There is a considerable body of evidence demonstrating the benefits of physical activity in terms of both treating and preventing diseases. Exercise has been called a “wonder drug” or “miracle cure”. Increasing physical activity improves health for those with chronic conditions and prevents many common serious medical conditions. The benefit is observed with small amounts of physical activity: 30 minutes, 5 times a week. For children 60 minutes per day is the recommended minimum. Lack of physical activity is the most recently recognised modifiable risk factor of all the large contributors to ill-health (poor nutrition, physical inactivity, alcohol consumption and smoking).

Additionally, this programme allows us to capture objective activity data, which is difficult and therefore not something that is often captured in evaluations of physical activity interventions. As such this programme is something that could be disseminated widely to shape practice elsewhere, raising the profile of DCC as an Enterprising Council.

4. Financial considerations:

The total value of the award is £100,000; £50,000 each year for 2 years. This funding will also include an evaluation of the project.

The finance for this project will be provided from within the Public Health budget.

5. Legal considerations

The Council is permitted to make such payments under the “General Power of Competence” set out in the Localism Act 2011. A grant agreement shall be used to set out the terms and conditions for which the grant is made. The recipient of the grant is not contractually obliged to deliver the services, although the Council would seek to claw back the grant in appropriate circumstances were there to be significant non-performance of any grant conditions.

In preparing this report the relevance of the following factors has been considered: prevention of crime and disorder, equality of opportunity, environmental, health, property and transport considerations.

REDUCING THE HARM OF SUBSTANCE MISUSE IN DERBYSHIRE

1. Purpose of the report:

To seek Cabinet Member approval for the award of Recovery Month grants to a total value of £3400.

2. Information and analysis:

Recovery Month takes place in September each year and is a national event. It has been celebrated in Derbyshire for the past four years and is an opportunity to showcase recovery from substance misuse, to reduce stigma and to highlight that recovery is achievable. Local activities have previously concentrated on large scale events which take considerable resources to organise and have tended to locate in Chesterfield as our largest town. Due to this, a number of smaller but active recovery organisations from other parts of the county have struggled to take part in a meaningful way, and recovery month in Derbyshire was starting lose momentum. On 13 November 2018 the Strategic Director for Adult Care approved the allocation of £20,000 over a three year period to encourage individuals, treatment services and recovery organisations to undertake their own projects, events and activities in their own localities. This approach is more inclusive of our geographically diverse county, and has revitalised the efforts of both local and countywide organisations and their service users. An annual showcase event, where achievements around recovery are recognised, has been planned for later in 2019.

This new approach has been welcomed by local organisations, and has generated a renewed energy and enthusiasm for collaborative working around recovery. In order to ensure that finance was not a barrier to delivering innovative and local recovery events, or engaging with larger organised recovery events, small grants have been offered to local organisations who support people in recovery.

Applications have been received at this stage for organisations to take part in the Recovery Games for 2019 and for other activities within Recovery Month, which as stated earlier, is September.

Recovery Games applications

The annual event, which has been running for five years, celebrates the success and achievements of those who are in recovery from long term health or drug and/ or alcohol addiction. Teams are made up of people from within the recovery community who have either 'lived experience' or who work, volunteer or mentor in the drug and alcohol service. Bids were welcomed for small amounts to cover costs of attending the event, including refreshments and fuel.

Four applications were submitted and considered by an evaluation team comprising the Public Health Lead and the Health Improvement Practitioner for substance misuse using a pre-determined, objective scoring template. All organisations successfully scored against the scoring criteria.

One organisation had duplicated costs in their application that were covered by another application and therefore were advised that their application would not be considered.

It is therefore proposed to provide grants to the following three organisations to enable them to engage in the Recovery Games for 2019:

Recovery Month applications

For Recovery Month, bids were welcomed for amounts to cover celebrating recovery locally. We encouraged innovation and creativity.

Five applications were submitted for this round from four organisations and were considered by an evaluation team comprising the Public Health Lead and the Health Improvement Practitioner for substance misuse using a pre-determined, objective scoring template. Four applications scored successfully against the

scoring criteria with one further application on hold pending a more robust financing and delivery plan.

It is therefore proposed to provide grants to the following organisations to enable them to engage in the Recovery Month activities for 2019:

3 Social Value considerations:

Social value benefits of recovery are highlighted by the ‘Life in Recovery’ Study (September, 2015) by Professor David Best from Sheffield Hallam University. This study showed that people moving into recovery were more likely to be in education or employment, to volunteer, eat healthily and take regular exercise.

4. Financial considerations:

The total amount allocated to develop Recovery Month activity in Derbyshire is £20,000 over three years. This was approved from underspends from the demand-led elements of the substance misuse budget which is met through the Public Health Grant.

5. Legal/ HR considerations:

The Council’s standard grant agreement shall be used to set out the terms and conditions for which the grant is made, which provides for clawback of funding in certain circumstances and shall also provide that the Council is not liable for any employment liabilities.

In preparing this report the relevance of the following factors has been considered: prevention of crime and disorder, equality of opportunity, environmental, health, property and transport considerations.

To provide an update on the projects supported under round four of the community activity and community safety Action Grants Programme.

2. Information and Analysis

At its meeting on 5 April 2018, Cabinet approved the establishment of a two year Action Grants Programme totalling £1.5 million to provide support to champion local communities, encourage local groups to deliver community activity and to support the Council's priorities in relation to resilient and thriving communities. The Action Grant Programme will run until May 2020 and enables local groups to apply for three levels of funding across four grant areas covering youth activity, community safety, community activity and physical/sports activity as follows:

- **Small Grants (up to £500):** Provides funding for 2,000 small scale, one off projects delivering positive activities in local communities
- **Medium Grants (up to £5,000):** Provides funding for new projects in local communities which can demonstrate local support and which have a more significant local impact.
- **Large Grants (up to £10,000):** Provides funding for new projects which have longer term viability, will continue to impact local people into the future and might cover more than one programme theme.

All projects need to be able to meet the following criteria:

- Support activity benefiting a designated area or area of interest in Derbyshire (excluding Derby City).
- Be time limited and not require ongoing funding from the Council.
- Complement, not duplicate other funding sources such as the Public Health Locality Fund, the members Community Leadership Scheme etc.
- Show how activity can benefit the community beyond the life of the funding.
- Meet an identified need which can be evidenced.

- Be delivered promptly and within agreed timescales.
- Show how local people have helped in the identification of activity or have been consulted/engaged.
- Show what difference will be made.

Projects that meet the selection criteria highlighted above are reviewed by an officer panel. Strategic Directors have delegated responsibility for the approval of recommended projects that fall within their remit. Cabinet agreed at its meeting on 5 April 2018 that approvals would be reported to the Cabinet Member for Health and Communities on a quarterly basis.

This report provides an update on the applications received, and approved, for the community activity and community safety grants under round four of the programme.

Round Four

The deadline for receipt of applications for rounds four of both the community activity grants and community safety grants was 31 March 2019. In round four applicants were only able to apply for a small grant as the medium and large grants are only available on an annual basis, with the next deadline being 30 June 2019.

- **Community Activity Grants** - Community Activity Grants provide funding to help local residents, groups and organisations support the development of local community activities and projects which help local people to come together to shape the future of their neighbourhood. Funding is available to support 375 local projects which cover the following types of activity:
 - Setting up a community group, local fair or festival
 - Developing a community space
 - Protecting the local environment
 - Supporting vulnerable groups, for example setting up a club for carers
 - Promoting a community website etc.

124 small grant applications, set out in Appendix A to this report, were received under round four requesting funding totalling £59,370. A small officer panel, comprising of representatives from Policy, Adult Care, Children's Services, the Library Service and the Voluntary and Community Sector met to assess the merits of each application against the required criteria. In total 105 applications, the details of which are set out in Appendix A, were approved to the value of £47,511.

- **Community Safety Grants** - Community Safety Grants provide funding to help local residents, groups and organisations support communities to be

safe places to live and work. Funding is available to support 500 local projects which cover the following types of activity:

- Address local needs to combat crime, disorder and Anti-Social Behaviour
- Tackle harm caused by alcohol, drugs and violence
- Reduce the fear of crime in communities
- Help build cohesive communities and encourage diversionary activities
- Help raise awareness of scams and online fraud

Three small grant applications under round four of the grant programme, set out in Appendix B to this report, were received requesting funding totalling £1,500. A small panel comprising of Community Safety Officers met to assess the merits of each application against the required criteria. All three applications, the details of which are set out in Appendix B, were approved.

Moving Forward

Monitoring of the Programme, including take up of the different levels of grants as well as geographical coverage, will take place on a regular basis to ensure equality of access across different communities in Derbyshire. This will ensure that there is some flexibility in the Programme as it moves forward and that spend is maximised. It will also help recognise those communities where more support may be required to identify and promote relevant projects.

4. Financial Considerations

The total cost of applications for both the community activity and community safety grant programmes stands at £49,011 and can be met from the Action Grants Programme budget. To ensure that there is compliance with the Council's Financial Regulations, all approved projects will be issued with standard conditions of grant and will be subject to monitoring and evaluation.
