04/21 MINUTES RESOLVED to receive the Minutes of the meeting of the Cabinet Member for Highways, Transport and Infrastructure held on 17 June 2021.

PLACE AND THE DIRECTOR OF FINANCE & ICT ON PERFORMANCE AND REVENUE OUTTURN 2021-21 QUARTER 4The report provided the Cabinet Member with an update of the Council Plan performance and the revenue outturn position of the former Highways, Transport and Infrastructure portfolio for 2020-21. The report contained elements that would be contained under different portfolios following the Council's Annual General Meeting on 26 May.

This report presented both financial and Council Plan performance data. The performance summary set out progress on the Council Plan deliverables and measures led by the Highways, Transport and Infrastructure portfolio. The remainder of the report gave a summary and detail on the revenue outturn position for the portfolio.

The report showed that progress was "good" for 2 out of the 5 Council Plan deliverables led by the portfolio, however, the deliverables "Roads and highways infrastructure", "Derbyshire infrastructure plan" and "Highway and Transport Services" had been flagged as "requiring review". After the use of additional Covid-19 funding, the outturn position for 2020-21 had been an overspend of £0.137m. It had been calculated that £2.346m of savings had been achieved by the year end. This compared to target savings of £6.660m and the value of savings initiatives, which had been identified for implementation in the current year, of £2.976m.

RESOLVED to note the report.

O6/21 REVIEW OF CHARGES AND PAYMENTS FOR COMMERCIAL WASTE, ABANDONED VEHICLES, RECYCLING CREDITS AND EXCESS MILEAGE

The Cabinet Member had been asked to review a number of charges made to the Waste Collection Authorities for the disposal of commercial waste and County Council payment rates for recycling credits, abandoned vehicles

and excess mileage related to the delivery of waste management services within the County.

The District and Borough Councils, as Waste Collection Authorities (WCAs), had a statutory duty to collect, on request, commercial waste from a range of organisations, such as businesses, markets, Government offices, etc. They collected around 13,000 tonnes of commercial waste per year, approximately 4% of the total municipal waste stream in Derbyshire.

The majority of commercial waste in the County had been collected and disposed of by private sector waste collection companies. The commercial waste collected by the WCAs was, however, disposed by the County Council through its waste management contracts with Renewi UK Services Ltd. The contract costs for disposal were initially met by the County Council and then recharged to the WCAs, as a straight pass through cost.

At a meeting on 12 September 2019, the Cabinet Member – Highways, Transport and Infrastructure approved the commercial waste disposal recharge rate for 2019-20. The recharge comprised a gate fee and contractual disposal costs incurred by the County Council, together with an administration fee.

RESOLVED to approve (1) the commercial waste disposal recharge rate for 2021-22 at £141.04 per tonne plus an annual administration charge to each Waste Collection Authority of £1343.86; (2) the abandoned vehicle rate for 2021-22 at £42.53 per vehicle in accordance with the Agency Agreement; (3) the recycling credit rate for 2021-22 at £61.84 per tonne; (4) the excess mileage payment for 2021-22 at £1.02 per tonne per mile or £40.82 per hour travelled; and (5) that the same principle for calculation of the above sums was used for the 2022-23 figures and that a further report would be presented to the Cabinet Member in 2023.

- 3.1 To provide the Cabinet Member with an update of the Council Plan performance position and the revenue budget position of the Infrastructure and Environment portfolio for 2021-22 up to the end of June 2021 (Quarter 1).
- 4. Information and Analysis
- 4.1 Integrated Reporting

This report presents both financial and Council Plan performance data. The performance summary sets out progress on the Council Plan deliverables and measures led by the Infrastructure and Environment portfolio. The remainder of the report gives a summary and detail on the revenue budget position for the portfolio.

4.2 As an overview, the report shows that progress is "good" for the majority of the Council Plan deliverables led by the portfolio, however, the

deliverables "Prepared a countywide response to the Integrated Rail Plan in relation to HS2, minimising any potential disruption and taking full advantage of the economic growth opportunities linked to the proposals" and "Implemented the gigabit top up voucher scheme and increased take-up of fibre enabled broadband across Derbyshire, particularly in rural areas, to improve access, speed and reliability for homes and businesses" have been flagged as "requiring review".

After the use of additional Covid-19 funding, the budget forecast position for 2021-22 is an overspend of £0.495m. It is forecast that £0.844m of savings will have been achieved by the year end. This compares to target savings of £2.916m and the value of savings initiatives, which have been identified for implementation in the current year, of £1.074m.

4.3 **Performance Summary**

The following shows an overview for Quarter 1 of progress on the Council Plan deliverables and measures relating directly to Infrastructure and Environment. There are no key measures relating to this portfolio.



- 4.4 Progress is "good" for the majority of the Council Plan deliverables led by the portfolio.
- 4.5 Key areas of success are:


- An updated value for money assessment of the Chesterfield to Staveley Regeneration Route has been carried out, with the project creating new homes and jobs for the area.
- Tender responses were received for the Natural Capital Strategy and for a consultant to be appointed in July 2021.
- 4.6 Key areas for consideration are:
 - Fibre enabled broadband Openreach has commenced work to deliver Full Fibre connectivity to an additional 300 premises under Contract 2. The change request to support this additional work is still going through the Department of Digital, Culture, Media and Sport (DCMS) assurance process. It is anticipated that this work will be completed by the end of Quarter 2. DCMS experienced delays with the launch of the new Gigabit Voucher Scheme and there has been a period of three months where suppliers were unable to register new voucher applications for community fibre projects in Derbyshire. It is expected that registration will commence during Quarter 2 but, as a result of this delay, there is no Top Up Voucher activity to report during Quarter 1.
 - HS2 There has been a further delay to the publication of the Integrated Rail Plan and it is now not expected to be released until September 2021. In the meantime, lobbying by the HS2 East group continues with stakeholders to support the completion of the project including the eastern leg. The alternative proposal study was completed in June 2021 and proposed that if the whole project was not completed, HS2 services should use Erewash Valley and Barrowhill lines to provide services in Derbyshire.
- 4.7 Further information on the portfolio's Council Plan performance are included at Appendix 2.

4.8 **Budget Forecast Summary**

The net controllable budget for Infrastructure and Environment portfolio is £43.508m. An additional £2.980m Covid-19 funding will be added to the budget to give a total of £46.488m.

- 4.9 The Revenue Budget Monitoring Statement prepared for Quarter 1 indicates there will be a forecast year-end overspend of £2.485m without Covid-19 funding.
- 4.10 As this overspend will be supported by the use of £2.980m of additional Covid-19 funding, which has been allocated to the

Forecast outturn against target budget




Council to support the costs incurred as a result of the pandemic, the forecast position is an underspend of £0.495m.

4.12 **Key Variances**

Waste Management, overspend £0.930m Increase in household waste tonnages due to Covid-19 (increase in people working from home).

4.13 Unallocated Savings, overspend £1.842m

The portfolio is carrying unallocated savings cuts from previous years that need to be addressed.

4.14 Budget Savings

Budget reduction targets totalling £1.074m were allocated for the year. Further reductions allocated in previous years, totalling £1.842m, had not been achieved and were brought forward to the current year. This

- has resulted in total reduction targets to be achieved of £2.916m at the start of the year.
- 4.15 The value of the savings initiatives which have been identified for implementation in the current year is £0.444m. In addition, there are £0.630m of savings initiatives identified in previous years which had not been achieved at the start of the year, but that are still expected to be achieved within the year.
- 4.16 The shortfall between the total targets and the identified savings initiatives is £1.842m.



Budget Savings

- 4.17 The £0.630m of unachieved savings from last financial year relate to Countryside and Waste. A brought forward figure of £1.842m is also allocated to this portfolio.
- 4.18 It is forecast that £0.844m of savings will have been achieved by the yearend. The table below shows performance against the target.

The alternative proposal study was completed in June 2021 and proposed that if the whole project is not completed HS2 services should use Erewash Valley and Barrowhill lines to provide services in Derbyshire.

Completed the viability assessment to progress the Chesterfield to Staveley Regeneration Route, which will create new homes and jobs for the area

An updated value for money assessment of the scheme was carried out in Quarter 1. This enables discussion with external funders over the grant request to be included in the Outline Business Case.

Developed the Natural Capital Strategy, identifying areas where the natural environment can be further enhanced in order to support healthy thriving communities, a vibrant economy and a healthy environment

Rating: Good Expected completion date: 30 Apr 2022

We have tendered for the strategy with 15 good responses. The tenders are to be shortlisted and a consultant will be appointed at the end of July 2021. The work will be delivered over a 9 month period, due to commence in September 2021.

We are advised that registration will commence 12 July 2021. As a result of this delay there is no Top Up Voucher activity to report for Quarter 1.
